



- With inside-outside circles, each student gets to participate in interaction that promotes learning.









Learning Theory in Finland


- The most important thing in education is learning, not teaching
- Based on international research in the field of education





Learning Theory in Finland

- socio-constructivist learning theory
 - learning always builds upon knowledge that a student already knows
 - learners are actively involved in a process of knowledge construction as opposed to passively receiving information
 - learning is a social process



Teaching and learning methods in Finnish basic education, grades 1-6

- Teachers have an power to decide which methods they use in their lessons
- Usually activating methods are widely used in grades
 1-6
- Some of the methods are subject-spesific, some can be applied to various subjects
- New national core curriculum (2016) requires teachers to use even more and more versatile activating methods



Teaching and learning methods in

grades 1-6

For example:

- Co-operative methods
- Experimentations, learning by doing
- Interactive methods, group and pair discussions
- Field trips: explore the concepts and ideas discussed in class in a real-world context
- Research projects: students research a topic and can present their findings to the class
- Creative methods: drama, art, handicraft etc.



Teaching and learning methods in grades 1-3

- In grades 1-2 teaching is highly integrated, not tightly divided into various subjects
- In grades 1-3 lessons also include a lot of playful elements







Work station method

- Widely used method in various subjects in Finnish schools in grades 1-6
- 5 different work stations
 - Board game "Finland" (mathematics)
 - Paperdolls
 - Rory's story cubed
 - Crisscross
 - Symbol
- Move together as a team
- Do the assignment in the station together as a group
- Change the station at your own pace






Activating school development campaigns in grades 1-6

- Liikkuva koulu ("Moving school": more physical movement to the school days)
- KiVa koulu ("Nice school": anti-bullying program for schools)
- Terve koululainen ("Healthy pupil": to promote physical activity at school and in spare time)
- Vihrea lippu (Green flag: environmental education)
